Safety First

Steel mills historically have been, and still are, inherently dangerous places. Workers must always be on their guard, for their lives and livelihood depend on their safety.

During the course of the twentieth century, many measures were instituted by management, workers, and unions alike to lessen the dangers of the industrial workplace and maintain steady production rates. The culture of safety was ingrained into the everyday work practices of the mill through training classes, films, manuals, posters, signs, personal protection devices, and tools. Working under the belief that repetition is the best way to enforce a message, Safety First became the mantra of every aspect of life in the mill. Reminders were found at every turn - from the locker room to the work floor, and from the meeting hall to the board room. Safety was paramount. Safety meant success for all.

Rivers of Steel's new exhibit incorporates films, manuals, posters, signs, personal protection devices and tools to experience what workers were exposed to on a daily basis to ensure their safety, and promote an accident free environment in the workplace. The exhibit opens March 23 at The Bost Building.

Hammer-In

Several years ago, the Smithsonian Institution completed a study of the W.A. Young Brothers Foundry and Machine Shop in Rices Landing and referred to it as "one of the most rare and unique historic machine facilities in the United States." On April 18, the annual Hammer-In presents an opportunity for you to visit the 108-year-old heritage site to experience the art of historic metalworking. Local enthusiast George Blystone will be on hand to explain the operation of the century-old, line shaft driven machinery.

The Hammer-In is a 30-year tradition that brings scores of blacksmiths to the tiny hamlet of Rices Landing for a day of blacksmithing demonstrations, tours of the foundry, a live auction of handcrafted iron work, and a picnic style lunch. The proceeds from the auction and lunch support the preservation of the historic machine shop and foundry, the Pittsburgh Area Artist Blacksmiths Association, and the Appalachian Artist Blacksmith Association.

John Steele, President of the Pittsburgh Blacksmiths Association, says the event is like "stepping back in time" to see traditional blacksmithing demonstrations by craftsmen such as Honest Bob Cruikshank, Boyd Holtan, and Bob Rupert whose work style is based on techniques from the 1700s.


Take advantage of this great opportunity to learn about this unique foundry and meet many of the smiths that will have items available for the 1:00 p.m. auction.



Local Folk and Traditional Artisans Receive State Funding

Rivers of Steel is proud to announce local artists who were recently awarded Fellowship and Apprenticeship grants from the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts (PCA). These grants are awarded on an annual basis to individuals who demonstrate artistic excellence, and they help to support folk and traditional artists who are masters of a living artistic tradition learned and practiced within their own culture or group.

The highest award recognizing artistic excellence given by the Commonwealth is a Fellowship. David Motak, Polish-American *szopka* (creche) artist was one of the recipients in this year's Fellowship round. Motak is the creator of Cracow Creche Workshop, which sponsors lectures and workshops in western Pennsylvania and across the country, hosts an annual exhibition of student works, and sponsors an annual Holiday Tour to Poland. Archives and Museums Interns

Rivers of Steel staff provided technical assistance to Motak and Conte-Forte by aiding them in applying for the PCA Fellowship and Apprenticeship Grant programs.
